Message from the President



Rarely has there been such a time of upheaval as we all witnessed in 2020. The world experienced a global pandemic, a transformative racial justice and equity movement, and widespread political turmoil – all on top of accelerating economic inequality and increasingly devastating climate change impacts. The Institute for Sustainable Communities (ISC) grappled with our own share of internal and external changes but remained focused on investing in growth and in our ongoing organizational equity and inclusion journey.

Like most – if not all – organizations, the spread of the COVID-19 virus in 2020 ushered in radical shifts in the ways we work. To protect everyone’s health, we converted ISC’s traditionally in-person convenings to virtual gatherings. Among our staff, Board, and partners, this often meant upskilling to deploy new virtual technology platforms. ISC’s programs in the U.S., China, India, and Bangladesh excelled notwithstanding the pandemic, and we closed the year with the launch of the Mekong Sustainable Manufacturing Alliance, which will expand our work on creative climate change solutions to Cambodia, Vietnam, and Thailand.

In 2020, ISC doubled down on our mission and living the values of equity and inclusion. Two prominent African Americans joined the Board of Directors, Nathaniel Smith, Executive Director of the Partnership for Southern Equity, and Dr. Marshall Shepherd, Professor and Director of the University of Georgia’s Atmospheric Sciences Program. We hired our first new President in 30 years, the first African American woman to helm a U.S.-based international climate change organization.

We listened to the voices for racial justice and equity we heard around the world. ISC already strengthens and facilitates community and local leadership and equitable climate change and sustainability solutions through our mission. Now, we’re even more focused on embedding the science, data, and best practices of equity and inclusion into decisions and investments that reduce climate impacts and advance a low carbon economy that benefits everyone.

As ISC enters its 30th year, our two co-founders retired – George Hamilton as President and former Vermont Governor Madeleine Kunin from the Board of Directors. This anniversary is a great opportunity to celebrate their dedication, leadership, and the incredible global impact they spearheaded, delivering over 130 groundbreaking projects in 30 countries. Their vision and collaboration set ISC apart as a community-led changemaker and holistic problem-solver.



I am thrilled to be entrusted with ISC’s stewardship. Let’s continue to lean on each other, pursuing our mission, doing what we know, and helping to ensure that equity and communities are at the center of the world’s climate change and sustainability solutions.

Change is never easy, and ISC’s road ahead is certain to have bumps. However, our successful track record holds us in good stead. Over 30 years, Madeleine, George, our Board, donors, staff, and partners established ISC as a global environmental leader, cementing our core allegiance, to unleash the power of people to make positive changes where they live, work, learn, and play.



Impact Highlights

CLIMATE CHANGE, HEALTH, & EQUITY

In 2020, issues of health, equity, and climate change were top of mind for many, and much of ISC's work was grounded in the intersection of all three. For example, The Kresge Foundation's Climate Change, Health, and Equity Initiative (CCH), for which ISC serves as the national program office, convened healthcare institutions, health practitioners, and community advocates from across the U.S. to develop **cross-cutting strategies and policies led by and prioritizing low-income communities and communities of color**. The success of the CCH led to ISC being selected to manage a second network: the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Health and Climate Solutions program. In this role, ISC is bolstering grantee communities as they identify and share effective solutions that **improve health, advance health equity, and address climate change**. In both of these programs - and in ISC's work across the U.S. and Asia - there is a focus not only on responding to climate and health emergencies, but on **addressing the historical and structural inequities** that exacerbate crises and lead to disproportionate suffering.

WATER STEWARDSHIP AND SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS

In recent years, cotton production has been devastated by climate variability. Rapidly changing climatic conditions coupled with poor resource management and misplaced incentives have put rural farming communities at risk of collapse. ISC has been working with the textile industry to look beyond the factory walls at the larger community, and that means supporting farmers in responding effectively to climate change. This year, ISC began **training 120,000 farmers and entrepreneurs, 45% of whom are women**, in sustainable water stewardship practices. Such techniques focus on reducing harmful farm inputs while protecting natural resources and improving yields. Equipped with this knowledge, these farmers will be better able to **safeguard their crops, mitigate climate risks, and bring economic opportunity to their communities**. The long term goal of the project is to scale this community-centric approach across Southeast Asia, **reducing the overall environmental footprint of cotton cultivation** while empowering women entrepreneurs and community leaders. ISC was proud to showcase this work and lead the discourse on agriculture, climate resilience, and equity at SIWI World Water Week, a major global conference, in August 2020.

For many organizations, 2020 was a turning point for highlighting racial equity. At ISC, our drive to improve diversity, equity, and inclusion in both our organization and our work began several years ago and 2020 marked an opportunity to look back at our progress thus far.


